### ALH Dhruv Helicopters Cleared for Army and Air Force Operations State

01-May-25

The Indian Army and Air Force versions of the Advanced Light Helicopter (ALH) Dhruv have been cleared for operations following recommendations from a Defect Investigation Committee, as announced by Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL). The fleet, comprising over 330 helicopters, was grounded after a tragic crash involving a Coast Guard ALH in January, which resulted in the loss of three crew members. HAL expressed confidence in addressing critical issues related to the helicopter's operations and criticized speculative reports that lacked its perspective. The resumption of operations is backed by a time-bound plan developed in collaboration with the users, further emphasizing HAL's commitment to safety and reliability in India's defense aviation sector. This development not only restores operational capacity but also reinforces the importance of indigenously developed defense technologies in enhancing national security.

# Small-Cap Firms Goodluck India and Nibe Boost Indian Defense Share

Two small-cap defense firms, Goodluck India and Nibe Ltd, are making significant contributions to India's defense ecosystem, particularly in the context of the indigenously developed Pinaka rocket Goodluck India is expanding its manufacturing capabilities with a new facility aimed at the aerospace and defense sectors, expected to generate substantial revenue by FY26. It supplies components for major defense programs like the BrahMos missile and K9 Vajra howitzers. Similarly, Nibe Ltd focuses on precision manufacturing for defense systems and has recently initiated production using advanced machinery designed for large components. Both companies exemplify the shift towards self-reliance in defense

manufacturing under the Atmanirbhar Bharat initiative, highlighting the growing role of smaller firms in enhancing India's defense capabilities and supporting the armed forces through technological innovation and strategic partnerships.

# Defence Ministry extends three-year ban on six firms for compliance. S SHARE

The Indian Ministry of Defence has extended the ban on six defense firms for an additional three years, continuing the prohibition on their dealings with the ministry. The companies affected include Singapore Technologies Kinetics Ltd and Israel Military Industries Ltd, among others, which were initially debarred in 2012 for 10 years. This extension emphasizes the ministry's commitment to strict compliance and accountability in defense procurement. The move reflects India's focus on maintaining integrity and security in defense contracts, aligning with its broader strategic objective of enhancing national security and promoting self-reliance in defense manufacturing.

#### India Leverages Boeing Orders to Boost US Trade Negotiations S SHARE

India is leveraging its substantial Boeing aircraft orders to strengthen trade negotiations with the US, aiming for a favorable bilateral trade pact that could protect it from higher tariffs. With Indian airlines, including Air India and SpiceJet, having placed orders worth \$67 billion for 590 planes, New Delhi seeks to showcase how these purchases can help reduce the US trade surplus. This strategy aligns with Prime Minister Modi's commitment to increasing US imports, including defense items. Additionally, it reflects India's proactive approach to enhance its economic ties and bolster Boeing's market presence in South Asia, while also addressing tariff concerns raised by the previous US administration.

# Pakistan Enhances Border Defense with New Radar and Artillery Share

In response to escalating tensions following the Pahalgam terror attack that claimed 26 lives, Pakistan has significantly enhanced its military capabilities along the India-Pakistan border. Pakistan's military is deploying advanced radar systems, including the TPS-77, and bolstering electronic warfare units to monitor Indian movements. Furthermore, the induction of Chinese SH-15 howitzers into artillery regiments and simultaneous military exercises involving major air assets underscores Pakistan's readiness for potential conflict. India, in turn, has condemned the terrorist attack and hinted at severe repercussions for Pakistan, including measures affecting the Indus Water Treaty, signaling a commitment to counter cross-border terrorism. These developments highlight the critical need for India to maintain a robust defense posture while addressing the ongoing security challenges posed by Pakistan's military buildup.

# US Approves \$131M Military Hardware Sale to Enhance India's Maritime Security Share

The US has approved a military hardware supply proposal worth USD 131 million to India, enhancing the strategic partnership between the two nations under the Indo-Pacific Maritime Domain Awareness program. This sale includes advanced software and support to bolster India's maritime capabilities, aligning with US interests in strengthening security ties. The US Defense Security Cooperation Agency emphasized that this move will not disrupt regional military balance and will assist India in addressing current and future threats. The contractor, Hawkeye 360, based in Virginia, is set to facilitate this critical supply, further cementing India's role as a key ally in maintaining political stability in the Indo-Pacific and South Asia.

# Indian Elite Forces Choose MKU Kavro Helmets for High-Stakes Missions Stakes

MKU Limited's Kavro Ballistic Helmets have been chosen by Elite and Special units of armed forces and police for high-risk tactical operations, underscoring the company's rising prominence in India's defense manufacturing sector amid the national push for self-reliance. The Kavro series, featuring advanced technologies like the TwistFit retention system and Multi Accessory Connector System, delivers proven

protection against high-velocity threats while supporting agility and versatility in dynamic combat scenarios. Although internationally recognized-with clients including the Philippine Army—questions persist around MKU's production scalability and costeffectiveness for equipping larger tactical units. Additionally, the continued dependence on foreign ballistic testing facilities highlights the urgent need for bolstering domestic infrastructure to accelerate innovation and deployment in India's defense ecosystem.

#### Tata Advanced Systems to Present ATAGS and WhAP 88 at DEFEA 2025 SHARE

Tata Advanced Systems Limited (TASL) will showcase key indigenous defense technologies, including the Advanced Towed Artillery Gun System (ATAGS), Wheeled Armoured Platform (WhAP) 88, and ALS-50 UAV at the Defence Exhibition Athens (DEFEA) 2025. The ATAGS enhances the Indian Army's artillery capabilities, while the WhAP 88 is India's first amphibious infantry combat vehicle, proving effective in challenging terrains. The ALS-50 UAV, already operational with the Indian Air Force, offers tactical advantages with its VTOL capabilities. TASL's participation at DEFEA underscores India's commitment to advancing its defense manufacturing and expanding its footprint in international defense markets, particularly in Europe and Africa.

#### BrahMos-NG to Enhance India's Rafale Fleet with Dassault Deal SHARE

India's defense capabilities receive a significant enhancement as the BrahMos-NG supersonic cruise missile is set to be integrated into the Rafale fleet following an agreement with Dassault Aviation. This integration, aimed at bolstering self-reliance, allows the IAF and Navy to utilize the BrahMos-NG's extended 290 km range and Mach 3.5 speed, improving the Rafale's operational effectiveness against enemy targets. Production of the BrahMos-NG will commence in a new facility in Lucknow by 2026, with an annual output of 80-100 missiles. While challenges in communication protocols may arise during integration, strategic advancements in India's multi-platform defense strategy position it favorably in modern warfare.

# IAF Boosts Combat Power with Astra MkII BVRAAM Entering Production S SHARE

The Indian Air Force (IAF) is set to enhance its air combat capabilities with the Astra MkII Beyond Visual Range Air-to-Air Missile (BVRAAM), which has entered Limited Series Production. Developed by DRDO, the Astra MkII is designed to outperform the Chinese PL-15E missile and features advanced technology such as an Active Electronically Scanned Array (AESA) seeker, boasting a range exceeding 160 kilometers. This missile will primarily be integrated with the Su-30 MKI, positioning India advantageously in aerial engagements and strengthening its defense strategy against regional threats. The Astra MkII's indigenous development underscores India's commitment to self-reliance in defense technology.

# CATS Hunter ALCM Redesigns with Advanced PTAE-7 Engine for Stealth Share

The redesigned CATS Hunter Air-Launched Cruise Missile (ALCM) showcases an advanced stealth-oriented configuration powered by the indigenous PTAE-7 engine, offering a range exceeding 350 km. This evolution from a conventional missile layout to a streamlined design enhances its radar evasion capabilities, making it suitable for deep-strike missions against high-value targets. Designed for platforms like the Su-30MKI and Tejas Mk1A, the CATS Hunter exemplifies India's commitment to indigenous defense technology while aligning with the Make in India initiative. By prioritizing survivability over speed, this missile complements India's broader missile program ambitions, enhancing the Indian Air Force's operational effectiveness against regional adversaries.

# Former NSAB Adviser Urges Talent and Tech Boost for India's Jet Engines Share

Anshuman Tripathi, a former adviser to the National Security Advisory Board, advocates for India's jet engine development to fast-track the Advanced Medium Combat Aircraft (AMCA) program by acquiring global talent and technologies. He draws parallels with historical cases, emphasizing that India should engage experts from the diaspora and establish a private equity framework for technology acquisitions. Tripathi highlights challenges faced by GTRE and DRDO, urging involvement from the armed forces and external expertise to align development with military needs. His

insights underscore the importance of learning from past failures to enhance India's indigenous aerospace capabilities effectively.

### India Completes Successful Firing Trial of Crewless 30mm Turret Share

India has successfully completed the firing trial of a crewless 30mm turret for its Futuristic Infantry Combat Vehicle (FICV), an essential step in modernizing its infantry forces to replace the aging BMP-2 fleet. This turret enhances firepower, situational awareness, and crew safety by allowing remote operation, crucial in contemporary combat scenarios with rising threats from anti-armor weapons and drones. The trial demonstrated the turret's effectiveness in engaging various targets, validating the multi-role capabilities of the FICV, valued at over \$10 billion. This success underscores India's advancements in unmanned systems and fire control technology, reinforcing the nation's commitment to defense modernization through the Make in India initiative.

#### **Geopolitics and Security Alliances**

## India Closes Airspace to Pakistani Airlines Amid Rising Tensions S SHARE

01-May-25

India has closed its airspace to all Pakistani airlines and military flights from April 30 to May 23, 2025, following Pakistan's similar move in response to the recent Pahalgam terror attack. This mutual closure reflects escalating tensions, with India intensifying anti-terror operations and enacting several countermeasures against Pakistan, including suspending the Indus Water Treaty and revoking visas. Former Air Marshal Sanjeev Kapoor noted that while Indian flights will face increased costs and longer routes, particularly from northern cities, the operational disruption for Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) will be more significant, with longer flight times leading to increased operational costs. Indian airlines are projected to incur additional expenses of approximately Rs 77 crore weekly due to these airspace restrictions, impacting their operational efficiency. Overall, these developments underscore the deteriorating security situation and India's firm stance against cross-border terrorism.

# Pakistan Halts Flights in PoK Amid Rising Tensions with India SHARE

Pakistan has canceled all flights to and from Gilgit, Skardu, and other areas in Pakistan-occupied Kashmir due to escalating tensions with India following a recent terror attack in Pahalgam. The national carrier, Pakistan International Airlines, suspended multiple flights from major cities, citing precautionary measures for national airspace security. In response to these tensions, Pakistani authorities have heightened security protocols, placing airports under high alert and increasing surveillance. This situation underscores the fragility of regional stability and reflects Pakistan's ongoing concerns regarding airspace security amid strained relations with India. Enhanced vigilance by Pakistani forces indicates an attempt to manage potential threats while tensions remain high.

# Indian Delegation in Cairo to Strengthen Defence Ties with Egypt S SHARE

A high-level Indian delegation, led by Defence Production Secretary Sanjeev Kumar, visited Cairo to enhance defence ties between India and Egypt, engaging in discussions with senior Egyptian defence officials. Both nations committed to closer collaboration, continuing a trend of growing military exchanges since 2021, including joint exercises and participation in international military events. This visit underscores the strategic partnership between India and Egypt, reinforcing Egypt's role as a key transit hub for Indian military assets and enhancing regional security cooperation.

# Pakistan Army's Tactics to Distract from Domestic Challenges SHARE

Recent reports indicate that the Pakistan Army, facing low morale and domestic pressure, may instigate conflict with India to regain public support. # Pakistan's sudden airspace closure disrupts flights to Islamabad Share

On May 1, 2025, Pakistan closed its airspace over a region bounded by Lahore, Islamabad, and Dera Ismail Khan, following the issuance of a Notice to Airmen (NOTAM) that warned of hazardous military activity at the Sonmiani Army Proof Range near Karachi. The NOTAM, effective from May 1 to May 31, indicates potential missile or weapons testing, with airspace restrictions up to 26,000 feet during specified hours. This development has disrupted numerous flights, leading to detours and mid-air returns. The airspace closure coincides with heightened Indo-Pakistani tensions after the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack in India-administered Kashmir, which resulted in 26 fatalities.

# Pakistan Army Chief Warns India of Immediate Military Response S SHARE

Pakistan Army chief Gen Asim Munir has issued a stern warning to India, stating that any military misadventure will face a "swift, resolute, and notch-up response." # Ex-envoy hails Indus Treaty suspension as a strategic masterstroke against

He emphasized that the treaty has failed to improve bilateral relations and argued that

evolving circumstances such as climate change and terrorism justify India's move. He deemed the government's action a prudent step toward national sovereignty and security, reflecting a necessary reassessment of outdated agreements.

# Retired General: Keep Pakistan Guessing Before Responding SHARE

Retired Lieutenant General H S Panag has advised India to practice strategic patience in responding to the recent Pahalgam terror attack, suggesting that a hasty military response could benefit Pakistan. He emphasized the need for India to keep Pakistan on tenterhooks while planning a calculated military action, pointing out that past operations have had limited effectiveness against Pakistan's proxy warfare. He advocated for a limited punitive response with controlled escalation and highlighted the risks of Pakistan seeking to provoke a premature strike. Other military leaders also echoed the sentiment of caution and precision in choosing targets for potential retaliatory actions.

# U.S. Defense Chief Warns Iran of Consequences for Houthi Support Share

The World Bank's role is non-binding, and the UNSC is unlikely to engage unless the situation escalates. Ultimately, Pakistan's plan is more a reflection of frustration than a feasible solution, as India, with its upper riparian status, maintains leverage over water as a strategic tool amidst ongoing tensions. highlighting the complexities of international agreements in geopolitically charged environments.

# US sanctions UAE firms tied to India over Iranian oil trade Share

The US has sanctioned four UAE-based firms linked to Indian companies for allegedly trading in Iranian petroleum products, aiming to curb Iran's destabilizing activities. The sanctioned companies, including Shivnani Organics FZE, reportedly provided substantial financial support to Iran's activities through exports to Indian firms. This move emphasizes US efforts to hold accountable entities involved in sanctions evasion and reinforce its stance against Iran's oil trade, which it sees as funding terrorism. Such sanctions could impact India's trade dynamics, highlighting the need for Indian companies to navigate geopolitical tensions carefully while maintaining their business interests.

#### **Military Operations**

### India Issues Stern Warning to Pakistan Over Ceasefire Violations S SHARE

India has issued a strong warning to Pakistan over its recent unprovoked ceasefire violations along the Line of Control (LoC) in Jammu and Kashmir, following a surge in cross-border firings that has raised tensions after the Pahalgam terror attack. The Indian Army has responded proportionately to the provocations, which have occurred over several nights, targeting multiple sectors. Amid this, border residents are on high alert, reinforcing their underground bunkers due to fears of escalation. India's response includes suspending the Indus Waters Treaty and downgrading diplomatic ties with Pakistan, indicating a firm stance against terrorism and a commitment to national security. This situation underscores the volatile dynamics along the LoC and highlights the resilience of the Indian forces and the civilian population in facing ongoing challenges.

# Pakistan on Edge: Navy Ready, Airspace Limited Amid Indian Tensions Share

With India ranking 6th and Pakistan 27th in naval strength globally, the drills are a demonstration of India's maritime capabilities and technological independence, emphasizing

commitment to maintaining security and asserting its dominance in the critical Arabian Sea region.

# Security forces reclaim key Karregutta hill in major anti-Naxal operation. S SHARE

Security forces in Chhattisgarh have successfully reclaimed the strategic Karregutta hill, a former Maoist stronghold, after a nine-day operation involving around 24,000 personnel from various security units, including the CRPF and state police. This significant counterinsurgency action, supported by air reconnaissance, is part of a broader government strategy to eradicate Naxalism by March 2026, with over 350 Naxalites neutralized in encounters this year alone. The Chhattisgarh government has clearly stated that no peace talks will occur with the insurgents, emphasizing a strict stance against violence, while also offering rehabilitation for those who surrender. This operation reflects the intensified efforts of the current government to secure peace and stability in the region.

#### India Enhances Military Readiness Against Dual Threats S SHARE

# US Defense Secretary Offers Condolences to India After Pahalgam Attack S SHARE

As tributes poured in on what would have been her husband's 27th birthday, she, alongside family members community leaders, participated in a blood donation camp organized in Karnal, Haryana, underscoring a collective remembrance of Narwal's service and sacrifice. Himanshi expressed a desire for justice while urging against communal backlash, highlighting the need for unity despite the grief and anger stirred by the attack. This unfortunate incident not only underscores the ongoing challenges of terrorism in Kashmir but also reflects the resilience and ethos of peace advocated by the victim's family, serving as a poignant reminder of the human cost of violence and the importance of maintaining communal harmony.
