India and France to finalize historic Rafale-Marine jet deal on April 28. [SHARE](#)

20-Apr-25

India and France are set to finalize a historic defense deal for the procurement of 26 Rafale Marine fighter jets for the Indian Navy on April 28, 2025, following approval from the Cabinet Committee on Security. This government-to-government agreement, valued at over Rs 63,000 crore, includes 22 single-seater and four twin-seater jets, along with comprehensive support for maintenance, training, and indigenous manufacturing. The addition of these advanced 4.5-generation aircraft will enhance India's naval capabilities, particularly in light of China's growing military presence in the Indian Ocean. The deal signifies a deepening Indo-French defense partnership and aligns with India's strategic objectives to modernize its military and reduce reliance on older Russian systems, reinforcing its position as a key maritime force in the Indo-Pacific.

India Delivers Second BrahMos Battery, Boosting Philippines' Defense [SHARE](#)

India has successfully delivered the second of three BrahMos missile batteries to the Philippines, enhancing the latter's coastal defense capabilities under a \$370 million contract signed in 2022. This delivery follows the first battery's successful airlift in April 2024 and demonstrates India's commitment to defense exports amid global supply chain challenges. The BrahMos system, celebrated for its supersonic speed and precision, is a testament to India's advancing defense industry, aligning with the Make in India initiative. Additionally, Filipino troops are being trained to ensure operational readiness, reflecting the growing defense partnership between India and the Philippines as both nations modernize their military capabilities.

Dynamatic and Deutsche Aircraft Unveil D328eco Assembly Line in India [SHARE](#)

Dynamatic Technologies and Deutsche Aircraft have inaugurated the assembly line for the D328eco turboprop aircraft in Bangalore, marking a significant stride in India's aerospace sector. This joint venture reflects India's commitment to the "Make in India" initiative, enhancing sustainable aviation through international collaboration. The assembly line not only symbolizes advanced engineering capabilities but also strengthens the strategic partnership between India and the EU, particularly with Germany. This development is expected to foster high-skilled employment, technology transfer, and a robust supply chain, contributing to a greener aviation future and reinforcing India's position in global aerospace innovation.

India's HEAUV Program Advances with Successful Development Trials [SHARE](#)

India's DRDO has successfully tested its High Endurance Autonomous Underwater Vehicle (HEAUV), which is designed for missions including anti-submarine warfare and mine countermeasures, emphasizing its capability to operate in contested waters without risking human life. The HEAUV, approximately 10 meters long with a diving capacity of 300 meters, features advanced sonar systems and a low power radar for surveillance. The Indian Navy aims to procure at least eight HEAUVs, augmenting its capabilities amid delays in submarine procurements. Additionally, the Navy is progressing with plans to acquire 12 extra-large unmanned underwater vehicles (XLUUVs), showcasing India's commitment to indigenization and modernization of its naval forces.

NSIL Collaborates with Private Firms to Boost Ground Station Network [SHARE](#)

NSIL is set to collaborate with private players to establish a network of around 25 advanced ground stations featuring dual-band and tri-band antennas for satellite communication, with full completion expected within 20 months. This initiative aims to enhance India's satellite communication capabilities, aligning with the government's goal to increase its share in the global commercial space market from 2% to 8% by 2033. By opening ground operations to private entities through a GSaaS model, NSIL is not only promoting private sector participation but also addressing challenges like regulatory clarity and technology transfer, bolstering India's position in the global space economy. This strategic move underscores India's commitment to expanding its space infrastructure and fostering innovation.

Taiwan's DronesVision Denies Ties to Pakistan Military Firm [SHARE](#)

DronesVision, a Taiwanese drone manufacturer, firmly denied any business engagement with USMS, a company linked to the Pakistan Air Force, amidst reports of potential dealings regarding military drones. The statement emphasized Taiwan's strict export controls and the prohibition of sales to certain nations, including Pakistan, underscoring the geopolitical sensitivities involving India and Pakistan. This denial highlights the ongoing challenges in the defense sector, particularly concerning unauthorized representations and the risks of misattributing military associations. With Pakistan significantly investing in drone warfare, the situation reflects the intricate dynamics of international defense collaborations and the vigilance required in compliance with export regulations.

India's Affordable Artillery Ammunition Disrupts Global Defense Market [SHARE](#)

India is emerging as a competitive force in the global defense sector, particularly in artillery ammunition, offering 155 mm shells at \$300 to \$400, significantly undercutting European prices of \$3,000. Indian firms, bolstered by the "Make in India" initiative, are also producing howitzers at around \$3 million, attracting interest from budget-conscious nations in Africa, Southeast Asia, and Latin America. Despite challenges such as perceptions of quality and complex export regulations, India's affordability and non-aligned foreign

policy position it as a desirable supplier in a fragmented geopolitical landscape, reshaping the global arms trade while meeting rising global demand for cost-effective military solutions.

IAF and DRDO Develop Stratospheric Airship for Enhanced Defense [SHARE](#)

The Indian Air Force (IAF), collaborating with the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO), is exploring the development of a stratospheric airship equipped with advanced infrared detection systems to enhance India's aerial surveillance and defense capabilities. This airship, operational at altitudes of 20-50 km, aims to detect stealth aircraft and serve as an early warning system against missile threats, complementing other IAF initiatives like dedicated military satellites and High-Altitude Pseudo-Satellites. As adversaries like China and Pakistan advance in stealth technology, this initiative represents a significant step in India's strategic shift towards a robust Space Force, potentially bolstering its multi-layered air defense network and ensuring comprehensive border coverage.

HAL Seeks CCS Nod for IMRH to Modernize Mi-17 Fleet [SHARE](#)

Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL) is set to seek Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) approval for its Indian Multi-Role Helicopter (IMRH) program aimed at replacing the aging Mi-17 fleet by 2032. The IMRH, a versatile 13-tonne helicopter, will enhance India's rotary-wing capabilities with tailored variants for the Army, Air Force, and Navy. Expected orders could reach up to 150 for the Army and 100-120 for the Air Force, while the Navy plans for 40-50 specialized units. Development costs are projected at ₹10,000-12,000 crore, with indigenous content targeted at 65-70%, aligning with the Atmanirbhar Bharat initiative to boost self-reliance in defense manufacturing.

IAF Calls for MoD's Full Support for Collaborative Combat Aircraft Program [SHARE](#)

The Indian Air Force (IAF) has urged the Ministry of Defence (MoD) to fully support a Collaborative Combat Aircraft (CCA) program, following HAL's initiative integrating autonomous drones with manned fighters to enhance combat capabilities. Facing a declining fleet with only 31 of the sanctioned 42 squadrons

operational, the IAF aims to modernize its forces amidst delays in indigenous projects like the Tejas Mk1A. The envisioned fleet of 200-300 cost-effective CCAs could significantly improve India's air warfare capabilities, especially along the Line of Actual Control with China and the Line of Control with Pakistan, while aligning with the Atmanirbhar Bharat initiative for indigenous development.

India's FICV Program Moves to Technical Evaluation Stage SHARE

India's Futuristic Infantry Combat Vehicle (FICV) program is progressing into the Technical Evaluation Committee stage, marking a significant step in the modernization of the Indian Army. Set to replace the older BMP-2/2K fleet, the FICVs will enhance firepower, mobility, and battlefield integration under the Make in India initiative, emphasizing indigenous development. They will support various operations across diverse terrains, align with modern warfare requirements, and include advanced technologies such as unmanned systems and network-centric capabilities. This initiative underscores India's commitment to enhancing its strategic defense capabilities and achieving self-reliance in military production, ensuring the Army is well-equipped to address both conventional and hybrid threats effectively.

Saras Mk2 Set for 2027 Maiden Flight with Enhanced Safety Features SHARE

India's Saras Mk2 program is set to make its maiden flight by December 2027, featuring enhanced safety and performance improvements over its predecessor. Following a tragic setback in 2009, the program resumed in 2016, focusing on redesigning wings and relocating engines. Hindustan Aeronautics Limited will manufacture the aircraft, with the IAF planning to acquire 15 units for troop transport and medical evacuation roles. The Saras Mk2, now with a 19-seat configuration, aligns with India's 'Atmanirbhar Bharat' initiative, emphasizing domestic aerospace capabilities and reducing reliance on foreign technology, thereby strengthening India's defense and civilian aviation sectors.

India Set to Finalize 6th-Gen Fighter Engine Deal Soon, Says DRDO SHARE

India is on the verge of finalizing a crucial partnership for the development of a sixth-generation fighter jet

engine, with a deal expected within the next three months. Dr. Samir V. Kamat, Chairman of DRDO, emphasized the importance of this collaboration with four international aerospace firms, aiming to enhance India's military aviation capabilities. The advanced engine, targeted to produce 110-130 kN of thrust, will incorporate Variable Cycle Engine technology for improved performance. This initiative, part of the broader AMCA program, is pivotal in establishing India as a leader in aerospace technology and ensuring competitiveness against global peers like the U.S. and China.

Defense Policy and Budgeting

Manipur Launches Verification of Arms Licences for Safety SHARE

The Manipur government has initiated a verification process for arms licence holders and dealers, instructing district administrations to examine their documents. The Commissioner (Home) has mandated compliance, warning that failure to do so may result in license penalties or cancellations. Additionally, the Manipur Police have required those in Kangpokpi district to submit self-attested copies of their licences by April 25 for verification. This move aims to enhance public safety and ensure responsible gun ownership, reflecting a proactive approach by the state to manage arms control effectively amidst regional tensions. Overall, these measures underscore the government's commitment to maintaining law and order and ensuring accountability among arms licence holders.

Geopolitics and Security Alliances

MEA slams Pakistan for misusing OIC before Modi's Saudi summit SHARE

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) condemned Pakistan for its continued misuse of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) platform ahead of Prime Minister Modi's visit to Saudi Arabia. Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri criticized Pakistan's longstanding habit of exploiting the OIC, emphasizing India's commitment to addressing these issues with fellow member states. Modi's visit, marking his first during his third term, underscores the strengthening partnership between India and Saudi Arabia, especially following the recent

State Visit of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman to New Delhi. This strategic engagement highlights India's proactive diplomacy in countering misinformation and bolstering alliances in the region.

Russia and Ukraine Trade Accusations Over Easter Ceasefire Violations

Russia and Ukraine are embroiled in accusations over a recently declared Easter ceasefire, with both sides claiming the other violated the truce. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy asserted that Russian assaults continued unabated, undermining trust in Moscow's commitment to peace. Russia's Defense Ministry countered by highlighting over a thousand supposed violations by Ukraine, including numerous drone attacks. Zelenskyy proposed a longer, unconditional ceasefire to foster genuine confidence, reflecting skepticism towards Russia's intentions. The situation illustrates the ongoing volatility of the conflict and the challenges faced in achieving a meaningful resolution, as both sides remain steadfast in their military postures while engaging in diplomatic rhetoric.

Ukraine and Russia conduct major POW swap involving over 500 individuals.

Ukraine and Russia successfully conducted a prisoner swap involving over 500 individuals, marking a significant moment since the onset of the invasion in 2022. Ukrainian President Zelenskiy confirmed the return of 277 Ukrainian service personnel, while Russia received 246 servicemen, along with additional wounded soldiers from both sides. This exchange highlights the ongoing conflict and the humanitarian efforts taking place, with the United Arab Emirates playing a mediating role. Such negotiations not only reflect the complexities of wartime diplomacy but also underscore the importance of international cooperation in crisis resolution, emphasizing the need for sustained dialogues to address the broader implications of the conflict.

Milipol India 2025 to Boost Global Security Partnerships

Milipol India 2025 is set to enhance global security collaborations, bringing together officials, industry leaders, and security experts from over 10 nations, including India and France. The event will showcase advancements in areas like cybersecurity and counter-

terrorism, emphasizing India's strategic ties with France. High-profile attendees will reinforce bilateral cooperation, and live demonstrations will highlight new technologies. This premier international platform aims to foster innovation, shape homeland security discussions, and strengthen partnerships, reflecting a commitment to addressing evolving security challenges and ensuring a safer future in the Indo-Pacific region.

Tejas vs. FA-50: Corruption Allegations Cloud Procurement Battles

The competition between India's LCA Tejas and South Korea's FA-50 in Malaysia and Egypt has been marred by allegations of corruption. Despite the Tejas showcasing advanced capabilities like AESA radar and compatibility with diverse weaponry, its export prospects are hindered by perceptions of it being less battle-tested. In contrast, allegations of bribery surrounding the FA-50 procurement processes in Malaysia and Egypt highlight a troubling trend of systemic corruption influencing defense deals. This situation underscores India's commitment to self-reliance and transparency in defense procurement, contrasting with the short-term, often corrupt practices observed in these nations that prioritize elite interests over national welfare.

Military Operations

Indian Navy Conducts Joint Maritime Drills with African Forces in Tanzania

The Indian Navy conducted significant exercises, including the Africa India Key Maritime Engagement (AIKEYME) 2025 in Tanzania and Exercise Tiger Triumph 2025, showcasing India's commitment to enhancing regional security through international collaboration. During AIKEYME, naval forces from multiple African nations participated alongside India, focusing on anti-piracy operations and maritime cooperation, which aligns with Prime Minister Modi's vision of mutual growth across regions. Parallely, Exercise Tiger Triumph involved joint humanitarian assistance operations with the United States, further promoting interoperability and operational effectiveness. Both exercises reinforce India's strategic partnerships, exemplifying the essence of cooperation and unity in addressing regional maritime challenges while enhancing security and goodwill among participating nations. This dual engagement illustrates

India's proactive role in maintaining maritime stability and fostering collaborative solutions in the Indian Ocean region.

Delhi to Host Tri-Services Future Warfare Course from April 21

The second edition of the Tri-services Future Warfare Course will be conducted in Delhi from April 21 to May 9, focusing on the impact of technology on warfare and necessitating a reevaluation of military strategies and doctrines. This enhanced three-week course, guided by the Integrated Defence Staff and the Centre for Joint Warfare Studies, aims to prepare senior officers for modern combat challenges, promoting jointness among the services. Participants will include a diverse range of military ranks and representatives from the indigenous defense industry, fostering discussions that align operational priorities with local capabilities. This initiative reflects India's commitment to shaping a future-ready defense force capable of navigating complex warfare landscapes.

Indian Air Force Joins Multinational Exercise Desert Flag-10 in UAE

The Indian Air Force (IAF) has deployed a contingent to the UAE's Al Dhafra Air Base for Exercise Desert Flag-10, running from April 21 to May 8, 2025. This premier multinational air combat exercise includes forces from Australia, Bahrain, France, Germany, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, South Korea, Turkey, the UK, and the US. The IAF is showcasing its MiG-29 and Jaguar aircraft, aiming to enhance interoperability and share best practices among the world's leading air forces. This participation highlights India's commitment to strengthening defense ties and military cooperation in the region, reinforcing its strategic partnerships with allied nations.

Terrorism and Counterterrorism

Four Maoists linked to C-60 commando's killing arrested in Gadchiroli

Four hardcore Maoists linked to the killing of a C-60 commando in February were arrested in Gadchiroli, Maharashtra. Among the arrested are Sailu Muddela, carrying a Rs 20 lakh reward, and his wife, Jaini Kharatam, with a Rs 16 lakh reward. They were found

conducting reconnaissance for further attacks and are involved in multiple criminal activities, including murders and encounters. The local police emphasized the commitment to intensify anti-Maoist operations in the region, showcasing the Indian security forces' determination to combat insurgency and enhance public safety in affected areas.

Joint Forces Arrest 11 Insurgents, Seize Weapons in Manipur

Eleven insurgents were arrested in Manipur, with arms and ammunition seized during intensified joint operations by the Army, Central paramilitary forces, and Manipur Police. The detained militants, linked to various outfits including Kangleipak Communist Party and United National Liberation Front, were involved in extortion and other criminal activities. Recent meetings between top Army officials and the Governor emphasized the need for heightened security in the northeastern region. This crackdown demonstrates India's commitment to maintaining law and order in regions plagued by militancy, reflecting an effective strategy to counter insurgency and ensure stability.

Pakistan and Afghanistan Unite to Curb Cross-Border Terrorism

Pakistan and Afghanistan have agreed to prevent cross-border terrorist attacks, affirmed during a visit by Pakistan's Deputy Prime Minister to Kabul. The talks focused on enhancing bilateral relations through security cooperation, emphasizing mutual responsibility in combating terrorism. This agreement follows heightened tensions and recent violent exchanges between the Taliban and Pakistan over militant activities. Bangladesh Police seek Interpol notice for ex-PM Hasina and 11 others.

The request stems from ongoing investigations into allegations of crimes against humanity linked to Hasina and former officials. The interim government, led by Chief Adviser Muhammad Yunus, is determined to bring Hasina back and has indicated potential international intervention. This situation highlights the political turmoil in Bangladesh and raises questions about regional stability, as India hosts a key political figure entangled in serious legal issues.

PM Modi to Strengthen India-Saudi Ties on April 22 Visit

Pakistan Denies Kulbhushan Jadhav Higher Court Appeal Rights

Kulbhushan Jadhav, an Indian national imprisoned in Pakistan, has been denied the right to appeal in a higher court, according to Pakistan's Defense Ministry. Jadhav, sentenced to death by a military court on espionage charges, only received consular access following a 2019 International Court of Justice ruling, which ordered Pakistan to reconsider his sentence. India's stance remains that Jadhav was denied a fair trial and was abducted from Iran, while Pakistan claims he was arrested in Balochistan. Notably, Mufti Shah Mir, who aided in Jadhav's kidnapping, was killed recently, highlighting ongoing tensions and complexities in this case.

Aerospace Leaders Gather in India to Shape Future Innovations

Global aerospace leaders convened at the 8th International Conference on the Future of Aviation and Aerospace (FoAA) in India, focusing on the nation's growing role in global supply chains and advancements in technology such as EVtols and AI. Nationwide Protests Erupt Against Trump Policies and Actions SHARE

Thousands rallied across the US in a widespread protest against Trump policies, organized by the activist collective 50501, which coordinated over 700 events nationwide. Demonstrators expressed opposition to aggressive immigration enforcement, budget cuts, and the administration's approach to international conflicts, particularly regarding Gaza and Ukraine. Protests highlighted concerns over civil liberties, dehumanization of minorities, and environmental protections, with specific grievances aimed at figures like Elon Musk. Although turnout in major cities was reportedly smaller than previous protests, the geographic breadth of the events indicated growing momentum against the administration's policies, reflecting widespread frustration among diverse groups including migrants, federal workers, and civil rights advocates.

Odisha CM and Spain Ambassador Explore Industrial Ties SHARE

ISKCON Leader Condemns Bangladesh for Hindu Leader's Murder SHARE

The killing of a Hindu leader in Bangladesh has sparked outrage among the Hindu community in both Bangladesh and India, with ISKCON Kolkata Vice President Radharaman Das criticizing the Bangladesh authorities for fostering an environment of fear among minorities. deep concern, emphasizing the incident reflects a "systematic persecution" of Hindus and urging the Bangladesh government to protect minorities.
