India issues RFP for six fast patrol boats to boost naval capabilities. [SHARE](#)

The Government of India has issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) to procure six fast patrol boats (FPBs) for the armed forces, aimed at enhancing capabilities for small team insertions, surveillance, reconnaissance, and patrolling of water bodies. This initiative falls under the 'Buy (Indian-IDD)' category, which mandates a minimum of 60% indigenous content, promoting self-reliance in defense manufacturing. The RFP encourages participation from Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEMs) and emphasizes national security in the selection process. This procurement reflects India's commitment to strengthening its naval capabilities and supporting domestic defense industry growth, crucial for maintaining security in conflict-prone zones and ensuring strategic maritime dominance.

HAL to deliver indigenous HTT-40 trainer aircraft to IAF from February 2026. [SHARE](#)

Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL) is set to begin the delivery of its indigenous HTT-40 trainer aircraft to the Indian Air Force (IAF) by February 2026, following delays attributed to supply disruptions of critical TPE331-12B turboprop engines from Honeywell. This aircraft will replace the Swiss Pilatus PC-7 MK-II in the IAF's training fleet, marking a significant step in India's aerospace capabilities. The HTT-40 project emphasizes indigenization, with 38% of its components sourced from nearly 100 private suppliers, primarily from India's MSME sector. Achieving military-specific certifications will not only enhance the aircraft's operational reliability but also open avenues for potential exports, reinforcing India's position in the global defense market.

Zorawar Light Tank with NAG MK-2 ATGM Set for Army Induction This Winter [SHARE](#)

The Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) has successfully validated the combat readiness of the Zorawar light tank with the indigenous NAG MK-2 Anti-Tank Guided Missile (ATGM), paving the way for its induction into the Indian Army this winter. Designed for high-altitude operations, the Zorawar combines advanced mobility, firepower, and protection, addressing the challenges posed by China's ZTQ-15 light tanks along the Line of Actual Control. With features like explosive reactive armour and enhanced situational awareness, this tank signifies India's growing autonomy in defense technology and armoured warfare. The impending deployment underscores a critical shift in India's military strategy, enhancing its deterrence capabilities in mountainous terrains while demonstrating significant strides towards self-reliance in defense manufacturing.

CSL enhances naval capabilities by upgrading Brahmaputra frigates and boosting indigenous warship production. [SHARE](#)

Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL) is spearheading the Indian Navy's modernization drive, focusing on the re-engineering of aging Brahmaputra-class frigates to extend their operational life amid increasing maritime tensions in the Indian Ocean Region. Chairman Madhu S Nair highlighted CSL's robust role in the maintenance, repair, and overhaul ecosystem, emphasizing a move towards self-reliance in naval sustainment. The program includes significant upgrades with indigenous technologies and a broader push worth ₹5,000 crore for mid-life refits. Furthermore, CSL is advancing projects for new vessels, including Anti-Submarine Warfare corvettes and Next-Generation Missile Vessels, reflecting India's commitment to boosting indigenous warship production and enhancing maritime security.

Singapore Launches Victory: Its Largest, Most Advanced Multi-Role Combat Vessel

Singapore launched its largest and most advanced warship ever, the Multi-Role Combat Vessel (MRCV) Victory, on October 21, 2025, marking a significant milestone in the Republic of Singapore Navy's fleet modernization. Built by ST Engineering and developed with the Defence Science and Technology Agency and international partners, Victory is a 150-meter, 8,000-tonne vessel designed as both a powerful frigate and an unmanned "mothership." It supports a variety of unmanned systems—airborne, surface, and underwater—and enhances Singapore's ability to safeguard critical maritime trade routes, including the South China Sea and Strait of Malacca. With an operational range over 7,000 nautical miles and endurance of 21 days without refueling, Victory can perform diverse missions by hosting modular payloads and advanced weaponry such as the Strales 76mm guided gun and ASTER surface-to-air missile system. The introduction of this flexible, drone-capable vessel reflects Singapore's strategic focus on future-ready naval capabilities, combining stealth, automation, and modularity. The first of six MRCVs, Victory will undergo sea trials and be progressively delivered from 2028, replacing the older Victory-class missile corvettes from 1989. This launch underscores Singapore's evolving defense posture in a complex regional maritime environment.

Zelenskyy, Kristersson Seal Defense Pact to Supply Up to 150 Saab Gripen Jets to Ukraine

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy visited Sweden on October 22, 2025, to sign a significant defense cooperation agreement with Swedish Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson, potentially enabling Ukraine to acquire up to 150 Saab Gripen E fighter jets over the next 10 to 15 years. The visit followed Zelenskyy's prior stop in Norway, where additional energy support for Ukraine was pledged ahead of winter. The letter of intent signed in Linköping, home to Saab's manufacturing facilities, marks a major milestone in Sweden's long-standing military support to Ukraine, which has already included a range of advanced weaponry. The Gripen E, regarded as one of the world's

most advanced 4.5-generation fighter jets, is seen by Kiev as crucial to strengthening its air capabilities against Russian aggression. Ukrainian pilots are already training on these jets, with hopes to begin operational use in the near future. While deliveries are expected to begin within three years, Sweden emphasized this as the start of a long-term strategic partnership, underscoring its commitment to a strong and capable Ukraine in the ongoing conflict. This development is notable amidst evolving Western military aid dynamics towards Ukraine.

IAI Unveils LAHAT ALPHA: Next-Gen Laser-Guided Missile with Double Range and Enhanced Precision

Israel Aerospace Industries (IAI) unveiled the LAHAT ALPHA missile on October 21, 2025, a next-generation laser-guided anti-tank missile that doubles the range of the original LAHAT missile from 10 to over 20 kilometers. This new variant is two meters long, weighs 25 kilograms, and features a larger warhead available in anti-tank and fragmentation versions. Its advanced laser homing guidance allows engagement beyond line of sight, overcoming GPS denial and limited visibility, thus enabling precise strikes on armored vehicles, fortified structures, coastal targets, and fast-moving threats. The missile is versatile, capable of launch from 105mm and 120mm platforms on land, sea, or air, including vehicles and helicopters. The development aligns with modern military requirements for longer-range, precision volume firepower, especially relevant for operations in urban and asymmetric environments. IAI president Boaz Levy highlighted LAHAT ALPHA's enhanced lethality, range, and cost-effectiveness, reinforcing its role in meeting future combat challenges. The missile benefits from decades of operational experience with its predecessor, widely used by various armed forces globally, including Israel's Defense Forces. This advancement may appeal to Indian defense forces for their evolving battlefield needs.

Lockheed Martin to Test Space-Based Missile Interceptor by 2028 Under U.S. 'Golden Dome' Defense Program

Lockheed Martin announced its plan to conduct an on-orbit demonstration of a space-based missile interceptor by 2028, a pivotal component of the U.S. Golden Dome missile defense initiative aimed at strengthening homeland security amid rising threats

from China and Russia. The Golden Dome program envisions a multi-layered defense shield, with space-based interceptors designed to detect and destroy ballistic and hypersonic missiles during their boost or mid-course phases, well before they can threaten territory. Lockheed Martin's CEO Jim Taiclet highlighted the company's evolving approach to research and development in achieving this goal. The technology promises to address current gaps in missile defense, particularly against highly maneuverable hypersonic threats that challenge existing systems like THAAD and PAC-3. Lockheed is competing with other major defense contractors like Northrop Grumman to lead this critical development. This test marks a significant advance in missile defense, potentially reinforcing India's strategic interests by demonstrating U.S. commitment to maintaining technological superiority in space and missile defense domains. The announcement was made in October 2025, underscoring the urgency and importance of the project within the evolving global security landscape.

India's Archer-NG MALE UAV achieves successful maiden flight, enhancing defense capabilities. SHARE

India marked a significant advancement in its defense technology with the maiden flight of the indigenous Archer-NG Medium Altitude Long Endurance (MALE) Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV), conducted by the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) on October 20, 2025, at the Aeronautical Test Range in Chitradurga, Karnataka. The Archer-NG completed a successful 45-minute flight, showcasing its capabilities in autonomous operation, advanced avionics, and fully indigenous turbocharged engine. Designed for both surveillance and armed operations, the UAV can carry payloads up to 300 kg and reach altitudes of 30,000 feet, positioning it as a vital asset for future military missions. Officials highlighted that the success of the Archer-NG reflects India's drive towards self-reliance in the defense sector, aiming to reduce reliance on imports and bolster operational flexibility for the armed forces. The program, led by DRDO in collaboration with Hindustan Aeronautics Limited and other national agencies, is expected to further strengthen India's aerial combat and surveillance infrastructure, with ongoing trials set to validate its operational readiness for deployment.

DRDO collaborates with Sagar Defence to develop advanced UXOR for IAF's safety and efficiency. SHARE

In a significant advancement for India's defense capabilities, the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) has partnered with Sagar Defence Engineering to mass-produce the Unexploded Ordnance Handling Robot (UXOR) for the Indian Air Force (IAF). This indigenous technological breakthrough enables safe handling of explosive devices weighing up to 1,000 kilograms, enhancing safety during bomb disposal operations. The UXOR features remote operation capabilities up to 2 kilometers and boasts six hours of battery life, ensuring effective deployment in diverse terrains. Given rising geopolitical tensions and the legacy of unexploded munitions, the UXOR represents a crucial tool that minimizes risks to personnel, thereby allowing the IAF to maintain focus on strategic objectives while enhancing operational efficiency in explosive ordnance disposal tasks.

PLAAF Shifts from PL-15 to PL-16 After India's Sinoor Operation Insights SHARE

The People's Liberation Army Air Force (PLAAF) is reportedly shifting its focus from the PL-15 beyond-visual-range air-to-air missile (BVRAAM) to the new PL-16, capable of better integration with stealth platforms like the J-20. This change follows India's Operation Sinoor, where captured PL-15E missiles from downed Pakistani jets allowed Indian forces to analyze their technologies. Analysts suggest this move aims to address vulnerabilities exposed by India's electronic warfare capabilities, as the PL-15E demonstrated significant failure rates. The PL-16's streamlined design and enhanced range potentially bolster China's air capabilities, but the reliance on older models highlights a transitional gap that may affect the PLAAF's operational readiness amidst growing tensions in the Indo-Pacific.

DRDO's Kusha M3: Compact 400km Hypersonic Interceptor Surpasses Russian Design SHARE

The Defence Research and Development Organisation has introduced the Kusha M3 missile, a hypersonic interceptor with a 400 km range and a highly compact form factor at 1,673 kg, setting new efficiency standards against contemporary systems like Russia's

40N6E. The Kusha M3 supports a multi-layered air defence architecture and incorporates advanced materials, modular design, dual-pulse solid rocket motors, and an active electronically scanned array radar seeker, ensuring high accuracy and operational flexibility against stealth, ballistic, and hypersonic threats. Designed to intercept aircraft, drones, and ballistic missiles at extreme ranges and altitudes, it features a 450 mm kill vehicle for greater lethality, precision guidance, and rapid response. Fully integrated with existing assets such as Akash, and supported by indigenous technology under the Aatmanirbhar Bharat program, the M3 is scheduled for user trials by 2027 and promises to bolster India's strategic air defence while reducing logistical and operational burdens.

Defense Policy and Budgeting

Defence Ministry mandates 75% indigenous content for IAF's MRFA proposal, seeking improved local manufacturing.  [SHARE](#)

The Indian Defence Ministry has recently flagged the Indian Air Force's (IAF) proposal for procuring 114 Multi-Role Fighter Aircraft (MRFA), stating that the submission was "incomplete" and fell short of mandatory requirements for indigenous content under the Aatmanirbhar Bharat initiative. Officials have reiterated that any foreign vendor must ensure at least 75% local content, highlighting the government's continued push for self-reliance in defense manufacturing. Dassault Aviation, whose Rafale jets are considered a leading contender, has been asked to participate in renewed discussions focused on a robust domestic production strategy. This comes at a critical juncture, as the IAF's active combat fleet remains limited to roughly 30 operational squadrons against a sanctioned strength of 42. The ministry stressed that successful execution of the MRFA programme would benefit India's defense ecosystem by fostering partnerships with Indian suppliers and MSMEs, and is expected to address key capability gaps while strengthening the country's air superiority, with further updates anticipated following high-level meetings in October 2025.

Discussions on Ladakh statehood and compensation ongoing at Kartavya Bhawan.  [SHARE](#)

Key discussions on Ladakh's statehood are ongoing at Kartavya Bhawan between the Leh Apex Body (LAB) and Kargil Democratic Alliance (KDA) with senior Home Ministry officials. This meeting, the first since recent violent clashes that resulted in civilian casualties, aims to address demands for statehood and Sixth Schedule inclusion, alongside compensation for affected families. The unrest erupted during climate activist Sonam Wangchuk's hunger strike, which authorities claim incited violence. The Centre has initiated a judicial probe into the incidents, underscoring the need for dialogue and conflict resolution in Ladakh. This situation highlights the critical balancing act the Indian government must maintain between local aspirations for autonomy and the broader stability of the region.

Geopolitics and Security Alliances

Trump Backs AUKUS Pact, Greenlights Australia's Nuclear Submarine Deal to Counter China's Indo-Pacific Rise  [SHARE](#)

In a significant development reinforcing the AUKUS security pact, US President Donald Trump has declared "full steam ahead" on the agreement, signaling strong support for Australia's acquisition of nuclear-powered Virginia-class submarines. During his October 2025 meeting with Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese in Washington, Trump assured that the deal, originally signed in September 2021, was progressing rapidly after a period of uncertainty due to a US administration review. The pact aims to bolster regional security by providing Australia with at least three advanced submarines and fostering trilateral cooperation in emerging technologies like quantum computing, hypersonics, AI, and cyber defense. Australia has invested billions in upgrading naval infrastructure, including submarine bases at HMAS Stirling and Henderson in Western Australia, securing a strategic foothold for US and UK forces in the Indo-Pacific. The AUKUS pact is viewed as a crucial counter to China's growing military influence, especially amid

recent South China Sea tensions. Trump emphasized the importance of the pact to regional stability, assuring Canberra of American military strength and continuous support for the Indo-Pacific security framework. Australia's defense commitments and investments reflect its resolve to uphold sovereignty and peace in the region.

Putin orders nuclear drills as Trump-Putin summit gets postponed.

Russian President Vladimir Putin has ordered drills of the country's nuclear forces, including the test-firing of intercontinental ballistic missiles, amidst stalled diplomatic efforts with U.S. President Donald Trump regarding the ongoing war in Ukraine. Trump's planned meeting with Putin in Budapest has been postponed, as he expressed concerns about the potential for a "waste of time" without effective groundwork. The Kremlin emphasized the need for thorough preparation before any summit, reflecting a cautious approach to dialogue. Meanwhile, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov has reiterated Moscow's opposition to an immediate ceasefire, complicating the prospects for peace talks. This situation underscores the broader geopolitical tension, as European leaders urge continued support for Ukraine against Russian aggression and highlight the importance of maintaining pressure on Russia through sanctions and military aid. The lack of direct dialogue between the U.S. and Russia raises concerns about the war's escalation, with Ukraine seeking enhanced support, including weaponry, to strengthen its position. The dynamics between the U.S. and Russia, especially regarding Ukraine, remain critical, as both nations navigate complex diplomatic and military landscapes, significantly impacting regional and global stability.

Strengthening India-US ties essential to counter Chinese influence, expert asserts.

Walter Russell Mead, a well-known American foreign policy expert, has highlighted the urgent need to deepen India-US relations as a pivotal strategy for countering China's expanding influence in the region. In a series of interactions during October 2025, he led a delegation to India where he met Prime Minister Narendra Modi and senior government officials, reaffirming that India's leadership remains committed to advancing a robust partnership with the US, despite recent bilateral frictions over tariffs and visa fees. Mead described

closer cooperation in technology, defense, and trade as critical to building a defensive coalition that safeguards shared regional interests, particularly in the face of China's efforts to draw neighboring countries into its orbit. The expert warned that unresolved issues between India and the US, especially as the Trump administration seeks to solidify its legacy, could undermine this strategic partnership. Indian leaders are optimistic about working with new US Ambassador Sergio Gor, and recent diplomatic engagements signal a renewed emphasis on mutual trust and global stability, placing India's interests and security at the heart of this evolving alliance.

Report: Pakistan emerging as a safe haven for Hamas operatives.

A recent report highlights that Pakistan is increasingly becoming a haven for Hamas operatives, particularly following the group's attack on Israel on October 7, 2023. Naji Zaheer, Hamas's representative in Pakistan, has gained prominence at pro-Palestine events, sharing platforms with notorious terror organizations like Lashkar-e-Taiba and Jaish-e-Muhammad. His involvement in high-profile rallies and conferences signifies Islamabad's apparent tolerance, if not endorsement, of Hamas's agenda, raising concerns regarding Pakistan's commitment to counterterrorism efforts. This situation poses a challenge to Pakistan's credibility as a global counterterrorism partner, particularly in the context of its status as a U.S. Major Non-NATO ally, while also reflecting broader geopolitical implications for regional stability and security.

UAE praises Pakistan-Afghanistan ceasefire, highlights Qatar-Turkiye mediation efforts.

The United Arab Emirates has expressed its support for the recently reached ceasefire agreement between Pakistan and Afghanistan, emphasizing the importance of diplomatic efforts led by Qatar and Turkiye in facilitating constructive dialogue. The UAE's Ministry of Foreign Affairs highlighted the establishment of mechanisms aimed at reinforcing peace and stability in the region, reflecting a commitment to enhancing security and meeting the developmental aspirations of both nations. This diplomatic development underscores the UAE's proactive role in regional geopolitics and collaborative efforts to address ongoing tensions, which could pave the way for improved relations

between Pakistan and Afghanistan and contribute to broader regional stability in South Asia.

North Korea launches missiles ahead of leaders' summit in South Korea. SHARE

North Korea has fired multiple short-range ballistic missiles, marking its first launch since May, ahead of a significant leaders' summit in South Korea next week. The projectiles, detected by South Korea's military, were launched from the vicinity of Pyongyang and traveled approximately 350 kilometers before falling inland. This provocative action comes as South Korean President Lee Jae Myung and U.S. President Donald Trump prepare for discussions at the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum, with implications for regional security dynamics. North Korea's continued missile development, in defiance of international sanctions, underscores the persistent threat it poses, heightening tensions in the Asia-Pacific region and necessitating a coordinated response from allies like the U.S. and Japan.

India rebukes Pakistan's Kashmir claims at Geneva, citing terrorism. SHARE

India firmly rebuked Pakistan for its attempts to raise the Kashmir issue at the recent Geneva Assembly, describing such interventions as habitual propaganda lacking factual basis. Indian representative Sarangi emphasized Jammu and Kashmir's legal accession to India and highlighted Pakistan's destabilizing actions through cross-border terrorism. She clarified India's decision to review the Indus Waters Treaty, citing Pakistan's violations as a reason for its abeyance. Sarangi reiterated that unless Pakistan ceases its support for terrorism and withdraws from occupied Indian territories, it holds no moral ground to discuss India's sovereignty. This stance underscores India's commitment to national integrity while promoting a narrative of peace and stability amid persistent challenges from Pakistan.

Netanyahu's India visit to enhance strategic and technological ties. SHARE

Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu's impending visit to India aims to strengthen the strategic and technological partnership between the two nations, focusing on joint defense production and advanced technology sharing. Key discussions are likely to center on enhancing air and missile defense systems, particularly layered

intercept capabilities and counter-UAV technologies, alongside cybersecurity and AI initiatives. The collaboration will also emphasize semiconductor cooperation, complementing India's push for self-reliance in chip manufacturing. Beyond defense, the agenda includes agricultural technology and renewable energy, underscoring both countries' commitment to sustainable development. This visit symbolizes a reinforced India-Israel alliance, positioned to address regional challenges while promoting innovation and security.

EU nations support strategic agenda to enhance cooperation with India. SHARE

All 27 member nations of the European Union have unanimously endorsed a new strategic agenda aimed at enhancing cooperation with India, focusing on critical areas such as defense, trade, and technology. This agenda, set to be formalized at an upcoming India-EU summit in New Delhi, emphasizes collaboration on maritime security, cyber defense, and counterterrorism. Additionally, it seeks to bolster regional connectivity initiatives like the India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor. The EU has also expressed intentions to establish a Security and Defence Partnership with India, highlighting both nations' commitment to safeguarding multilateralism and a rules-based international order. This strategic alignment underscores India's growing global influence and the potential for deeper defense industrial cooperation amidst a complex geopolitical landscape.

Indonesia enhances defense with India's BrahMos and China's YJ-12 missiles for maritime security. SHARE

Indonesia is set to enhance its maritime defense by integrating India's BrahMos supersonic cruise missiles and China's CM-302 (YJ-12) missiles into a comprehensive missile umbrella as part of President Prabowo Subianto's Minimum Essential Force 2035 roadmap. This \$1.45 billion initiative aims to strengthen security across Indonesia's vast archipelago amid increasing tensions in the South China Sea, where Indonesia faces complex sovereignty disputes over its exclusive economic zone near the Natuna Islands. Despite ongoing territorial frictions with China, Jakarta's strategy reflects a nuanced diplomatic balancing act of cooperating with both New Delhi and Beijing. The prospective \$450 million BrahMos deal, nearing finalization in 2025 after extensive negotiations

and high-level visits, bolsters India's defense export footprint in ASEAN and solidifies its strategic influence in the Indo-Pacific. Meanwhile, acquiring China's CM-302 offers Indonesia affordable, proven long-range capabilities. This dual missile procurement enhances Indonesia's deterrence against regional threats, supports its aspirations for autonomous regional defense, and underscores its evolving role in maintaining stability amid South China Sea rivalries involving major powers.

Trump links tariffs to national security, claims trade can resolve India-Pakistan conflict.

US President Donald Trump recently asserted that he has resolved multiple conflicts, including the longstanding India-Pakistan dispute, through the application of trade and tariffs, claiming that he warned both countries a trade deal would be off the table if hostilities resumed. Trump emphasized this approach as a means to avert nuclear catastrophe, suggesting that economic incentives can influence geopolitical stability. However, India has consistently maintained that its issues with Pakistan are bilateral matters that require direct negotiations, independent of external influence. This assertion by Trump highlights the complex interplay between trade and security, emphasizing the challenges of foreign intervention in regional conflicts, and reveals the need for India to engage with Pakistan through dialogue to achieve a lasting resolution.

Trump announces 155% tariffs on China to address trade imbalance and national security concerns.

President Trump announced an escalation in U.S.-China trade tensions, confirming a staggering 155% tariff on China starting November 1, citing an economic imbalance that has persisted under previous administrations. He emphasized that these measures are intertwined with national security, particularly in light of China's energy trade with Russia amid the ongoing conflict in Ukraine. This announcement aligns with a broader strategy of utilizing trade policy to protect American interests and restore industrial resilience. The implications of these tariffs, seen as a response to China's aggressive economic practices, may strain global markets but reflect a determined stance by the U.S. to recalibrate its trade relations in pursuit of greater economic sovereignty.

Trump Celebrates Diwali, Discusses Trade and Peace with PM Modi

In a significant display of cultural diplomacy, President Trump marked Diwali at the White House, commending Prime Minister Narendra Modi and celebrating the Indian-American community's contributions. The event, attended by senior officials and business leaders, showcased a bipartisan resolution introduced in Congress to recognize Diwali's religious and cultural importance. Trump emphasized the festival's themes of light over darkness and knowledge over ignorance, reinforcing the spirit of unity and inclusivity in US-India relations. This celebration not only highlights the growing engagement between the two nations but also reflects the importance of the Indian diaspora in fostering stronger political and economic ties, reinforcing India's significance as a key partner in global affairs.

ISRO to launch AST SpaceMobile's BlueBird-6 satellite on October 19, 2025.



22-Oct-25

The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) is set to launch the 6.5-ton BlueBird-6 satellite for Texas-based AST SpaceMobile on October 19, 2025, utilizing its most powerful rocket, the Launch Vehicle Mark-3 (LVM3). This satellite aims to enhance mobile broadband connectivity in remote regions, addressing the global digital divide by providing direct-to-device services from Low Earth Orbit (LEO). BlueBird-6 is part of a broader constellation plan that includes multiple satellites designed to deliver extensive bandwidth and improve mobile coverage. The successful launch, managed by NewSpace India Limited, underscores India's growing capabilities in the commercial space sector and positions the nation as a key player in satellite-based connectivity solutions.

NSCN(IM) chief Muivah visits native Manipur village after 50 years.



22-Oct-25

NSCN (IM) chief Th Muivah has returned to his native village Somdal in Manipur's Ukhrul district after a 50-year absence, amid ongoing ethnic violence in the region. His arrival was marked by a significant turnout of locals, including traditional celebrations, as he is a pivotal figure in Naga peace negotiations with the Indian government. Muivah, who has been instrumental in the peace talks since the NSCN (IM) ceasefire in 1997, plans to stay in Somdal for a week before

heading to Dimapur. This visit occurs during a critical period of unrest in Manipur, highlighting the fragile state of peace and the importance of dialogue in resolving long-standing conflicts in the region.

Congress accuses Modi of obscuring facts amid Trump's Russian oil remarks.

Recent statements by U.S. President Donald Trump regarding India's oil imports from Russia have sparked controversy, with the Congress party accusing Prime Minister Narendra Modi of concealing essential details from the public. Following a phone call between Trump and Modi during Diwali, Trump claimed that India would significantly reduce its oil purchases from Russia, a statement he has made multiple times in recent days. While the Congress has criticized Modi for allegedly outsourcing key decisions to the U.S., Indian officials have maintained that the nation's energy import policies are driven by domestic economic priorities and not external pressures. The Ministry of External Affairs reiterated that India's decisions regarding oil imports aim to protect consumer interests amidst a volatile global energy market. Trump's remarks also come in the context of heightened trade tensions between the U.S. and China, as he announced substantial new tariffs aimed at countering perceived economic exploitation. This ongoing dialogue illustrates the delicate balance in U.S.-India relations, as India seeks to navigate its energy needs while maintaining its sovereignty in decision-making. The situation underscores the complexities of international diplomacy, where energy security and economic interests often intersect with geopolitical pressures.

Military Operations

ULFA-I militant involved in Assam army camp attack killed in Arunachal encounter.



22-Oct-25

In a significant operation conducted in the Namsai district of Arunachal Pradesh, security forces, led by the Assam Rifles, killed a suspected member of the banned militant outfit United Liberation Front of Assam (Independent) or ULFA (I). This encounter, which occurred on the night of October 21/22, was a direct response to an earlier attack on an Army camp in Kakopathar, Assam, on October 17, where militants

used grenade launchers and automatic rifles, injuring three soldiers. Following intelligence inputs about the presence of ULFA (I) cadres in the area, the Assam Rifles launched a counter-operation that resulted in a fierce gun battle, leading to the death of the insurgent, identified as Sergeant Major Iwon Axom, along with the recovery of an automatic rifle, an RPG round, and other materials. The operation underscores the persistent threat posed by militant groups in the region, particularly as Arunachal Pradesh shares a strategically significant border with China, which disputes India's claim over the territory. The Indian security forces' ongoing efforts to combat militancy in northeastern India are crucial for maintaining stability in this border area, thereby reinforcing national security.

Naval Commanders Conference 2025 focuses on operational readiness and regional security cooperation.

The Indian Navy's biannual Commanders Conference 2025 commenced, emphasizing enhanced operational capabilities amid sustained high activity levels, particularly in light of Operation Sindoor. Key discussions will center on interoperability with the Indian Army, Air Force, and Coast Guard, reflecting the Navy's commitment to addressing emerging threats in the Indian Ocean Region and Indo-Pacific. Defence Minister Rajnath Singh and other top military leaders will provide insights on national security strategies, including advancements in technology and logistics under the Make in India initiative. This conference is strategically important for assessing operational readiness and reinforcing the Navy's role as a key security partner in regional stability and cooperation, aligning with India's broader geopolitical objectives and the vision for Viksit Bharat 2047.

India elevates Kabul mission to embassy, enhancing ties with Afghanistan.



22-Oct-25

India has officially upgraded its technical mission in Kabul to the status of an embassy, marking a significant step in enhancing bilateral relations with Afghanistan after the Taliban's return to power in August 2021. This decision follows a recent visit by Afghan Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi to India, during which he emphasized the Taliban's commitment to preventing any elements from using Afghan territory against India's interests. Taliban Defence Minister Mullah Yaqoob, while dismissing allegations from Pakistan regarding India's involvement in clashes

between Afghanistan and Pakistan, stated that Kabul seeks to strengthen ties with New Delhi based on mutual interests. This move reflects India's ongoing strategy to engage with Afghanistan, primarily through humanitarian and development assistance, despite not officially recognizing the Taliban government. The upgrade to embassy status is viewed as a positive indication of India's goal to play a constructive role in Afghanistan's stability and development, reinforcing its position in regional geopolitics amid rising tensions between Afghanistan and Pakistan. This development is significant as it underscores India's commitment to fostering peace and stability in a crucial region while navigating complex diplomatic dynamics following the Taliban's ascendance.

Rajnath Singh to attend Army Commanders Conference in Jaisalmer.

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh is set to embark on a three-day visit to Jaisalmer from October 23, coinciding with the Army Commanders Conference, which is being held in the region for the first time since Operation Sindoor. Singh will pay tribute to fallen soldiers at the Longewala border post and inaugurate several development projects, including the Army War Museum and related parks. India's Exercise Trishul to strengthen tri-service synergy in Sir Creek.

Assessing journalist challenges and misinformation during Operation Sindoor.

During a recent session at The Media Rumble 2025 in Bengaluru, panelists discussed the challenges faced by journalists during Operation Sindoor, highlighting the surge of misinformation that undermined India's narrative. Independent journalist Nirupama Subramanian pointed out the contrasting narratives, with some claiming Pakistan's victory, while Stanly Johny criticized the Indian media's failures in verification. Roman Gautam referred to the detrimental impact of competitive nationalism among journalists, labeling some as warmongers. Yogita Limaye stressed the lack of protective measures and training for journalists during conflicts, reflecting the broader risks faced in war reporting. This discussion underscores the critical need for responsible reporting, particularly in conflict zones, to ensure accurate information that reflects India's strategic interests.

Terrorism and Counterterrorism

Punjab Police arrest two terrorists in Amritsar, seizing grenade and launcher linked to ISI.

In a significant counter-terrorism operation, Punjab Police arrested two operatives, Mehakdeep Singh and Aditya, in Amritsar, seizing a rocket-propelled grenade (RPG) and launcher intended for a targeted attack. The arrests were made following intelligence inputs linking the duo to Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI), with the weapon reportedly delivered via drone. Investigations are ongoing to uncover the broader network involved, including connections to Harpreet Singh, currently imprisoned, who directed the operation. This incident underscores the persistent threat of cross-border terrorism in India and highlights the effectiveness of coordinated intelligence efforts to thwart such attacks, reinforcing the need for vigilance in national security strategies.

Jaish-e-Mohammed launches online jihadi course for women, led by Masood Azhar's sisters. SHARE

Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM), a Pakistan-based terrorist group long implicated in attacks targeting India, has reportedly inaugurated an online indoctrination and training programme specifically targeting women under the banner "Tufat al-Muminat." This initiative, led by the sisters of JeM's founder Masood Azhar, is being conducted through encrypted messaging apps and social media, enabling the group to recruit women into its new women's wing, Jamaat-ul-Mominaat. This tactic marks a notable shift in JeM's operational strategy, intensifying concerns that women may soon be deployed in sabotage and terror missions against Indian targets. The programme is believed to include modules on religious extremism and bomb-making, and is aimed at radicalizing and mobilizing young women for active roles in violent jihad. The move comes against the backdrop of Indian airstrikes, like the Balakot operation in 2019, which significantly damaged JeM's infrastructure and forced it to adapt its methods by relocating bases and pushing aggressive fundraising. Despite Pakistan's repeated claims of acting against terror outfits, the persistence and evolution of groups like JeM threaten regional stability, putting Indian security agencies on heightened alert.

Drone strike near Indo-Myanmar border kills five NSCN-K militants. SHARE

A recent drone strike targeting the insurgent group NSCN-K (Yung Aung) near the India-Myanmar border in Arunachal Pradesh resulted in the deaths of five militants, including bodyguards of a senior leader. This follows an earlier attack on October 16, where insurgents ambushed an Assam Rifles company operating base, injuring two personnel. In response, NSCN-K condemned the drone strikes, alleging civilian casualties, including a man and an 8-year-old girl, and labeling the attacks as violations of international norms. These developments highlight the ongoing tensions in the region and the Indian government's commitment to counter-terrorism efforts, emphasizing its resolve to address threats from insurgent groups while navigating complex humanitarian concerns.

Cybersecurity and Information Warfare

Jaguar Land Rover hack costs UK economy \$2.5 billion, report reveals. SHARE

The recent cyber attack on Jaguar Land Rover (JLR), a subsidiary of Tata Motors, has been classified as the most economically damaging cyber event in UK history, incurring an estimated cost of £1.9 billion (approximately \$2.55 billion). According to a report from the Cyber Monitoring Centre (CMC), the incident, which began on September 1, led to a five-week halt in production and affected over 5,000 businesses within JLR's supply chain. The ongoing fallout is expected to delay full recovery until January 2026. The attack has been categorized as a Category 3 systemic event, indicating significant disruption, and highlights the urgent need for better cybersecurity measures among organizations. As JLR gradually resumes manufacturing, having incurred losses of about £50 million weekly, the incident serves as a stark reminder of the vulnerabilities faced by major corporations in an increasingly digital landscape. The British government's provision of a £1.5 billion loan guarantee aims to support the company and its suppliers during this challenging period. This situation underscores the critical importance of robust cybersecurity frameworks to protect vital industry sectors from potential threats, which is particularly relevant as global geopolitical tensions heighten the risks associated with cyber warfare.

Meta launches security tools for Messenger and WhatsApp to protect users from scams. SHARE

Meta has unveiled new security tools for Messenger and WhatsApp designed to enhance account protection and assist older adults in avoiding scams. As part of Cybersecurity Awareness Month, these features facilitate easier reporting of suspicious messages and automatically block accounts exhibiting scam behaviors. This initiative follows the detection and disruption of nearly 8 million fraudulent accounts across Meta's platforms. Additionally, Meta's collaboration with the National Elder Fraud Coordination Center aims to bolster information sharing and response times to scams targeting seniors, who collectively lost \$4.8 billion to fraud last year. This move significantly highlights the importance of

safeguarding vulnerable populations in the digital age, reinforcing Meta's commitment to creating a safer online environment.

Chinese hackers exploit SharePoint vulnerability, targeting organizations globally. SHARE

Hackers associated with China have exploited a vulnerability (CVE-2025-53770) in Microsoft SharePoint, targeting various organizations across four continents, including government agencies, universities, and finance institutions. The attacks, reported by cybersecurity firm Symantec, began shortly after the vulnerability was disclosed as a zero-day exploit. Threat groups such as Budworm and Storm-2603 have utilized sophisticated tactics, including webshells and backdoors, to gain persistent access and execute commands. This incident underscores a troubling trend of state-sponsored cyber intrusions, revealing the necessity for enhanced cybersecurity measures and international collaboration to safeguard sensitive data and infrastructure against such persistent threats.

Europe's Cyber Blueprint Enhances Regional Cooperation Against Threats SHARE

In June 2025, the European Union adopted the Cyber Crisis Management Blueprint, a framework designed to enhance collective cyber resilience among member states in response to escalating cyber threats, particularly from state-backed actors like Russia and China. This initiative aims to standardize detection and response protocols during crises, improve interoperability, and facilitate rapid information sharing through established networks. Key components include the Cyber Solidarity Act and a cybersecurity reserve for emergency expertise, which collectively strengthen the EU's operational readiness. The Blueprint serves not only as a robust model for EU nations but also offers valuable lessons for other regional entities, emphasizing the necessity of coordinated responses in an increasingly interconnected and vulnerable cyber landscape.

Cyber attack on Jaguar Land Rover costs UK £1.9 billion, highlighting cybersecurity vulnerabilities. SHARE

A recent cyber attack on Jaguar Land Rover has reportedly cost the UK automotive giant approximately

£1.9 billion. This incident underscores the increasing vulnerability of major corporations to cyber threats, prompting discussions about the necessity for enhanced cybersecurity measures across industries. The financial impact of such attacks raises concerns not only for individual companies but also for national economic stability, given the potential disruptions in supply chains and consumer trust. As businesses become more interconnected, the need for robust defense mechanisms against cyber threats becomes increasingly critical, reflecting a broader trend that nations, including India, must consider in their strategic defense planning to protect critical infrastructure and economic interests.

NLSIU alumni to host Cyber Vidhi Sangam 2025 on cybersecurity, law. SHARE

The National Law School India University (NLSIU) alumni will host Cyber Vidhi Sangam 2025, a technological conclave focused on law, cybersecurity, and strategic governance, on October 24 in Bengaluru. The event aims to foster dialogue among legal scholars, policymakers, corporate CISOs, enforcement officials, and entrepreneurs to shape India's cyber-legal framework amidst evolving technologies and the implementation of the Digital Personal Data Protection Act. By bridging the gap between technological innovation and legal frameworks, the conclave seeks to influence policy and promote industry collaboration. This initiative highlights the urgent need for comprehensive governance in the rapidly advancing digital landscape, underscoring India's commitment to safeguarding data and enhancing cybersecurity measures.

CERT-In Alerts Chrome Users about Severe Remote Code Execution Flaw SHARE

The Indian Computer Emergency Response Team (CERT-In) has issued a high-severity warning regarding a remote code execution vulnerability affecting Google Chrome on desktop systems. This flaw could allow attackers to execute arbitrary code, potentially leading to full system compromise or service disruptions. The vulnerability impacts versions of Chrome prior to 141.0.7390.122/.123 on Windows, macOS, and Linux. CERT-In recommends users promptly update their browsers to the latest version, with Google confirming that the fix was included in its recent Stable Channel Update on October 21, 2025. The significance of this advisory underscores the critical need for vigilance in

cybersecurity, particularly as reliance on digital platforms continues to grow.

India Strengthens Cybersecurity with TRAI's New Verification Measures SHARE

In a strategic move to bolster India's cybersecurity framework, the Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) has convened a significant meeting with top regulators and industry leaders to combat rising threats such as spam, phishing, and cyber fraud. The meeting, which included representatives from the Reserve Bank of India and major tech firms, focused on proposals for enhanced security measures, including real-time credential validation and mandatory whitelisting of communication links used in financial services. TRAI's initiatives aim to restore consumer trust in digital transactions, particularly through a new 1600-series numbering plan for the BFSI sector. This collaborative effort underscores the importance of a unified approach in safeguarding digital ecosystems, reflecting India's commitment to enhancing cybersecurity in its rapidly growing digital economy.

Phishing email disguised as Microsoft highlights rising cyber threat sophistication. SHARE

A recent incident involving a deceptive phishing email highlights the growing sophistication of cybercriminal tactics. A Reddit user received a seemingly legitimate password reset email from "rnicrosoft.com," which cleverly masqueraded as a Microsoft communication by closely imitating its branding. The sender's address, featuring a subtle alteration in the domain, nearly tricked the user into compromising personal information. This homograph scam reflects an alarming trend where cyber threats mimic trusted sources with high precision, making them harder to detect. Cybersecurity experts emphasize the importance of vigilance, urging users to verify sender domains and avoid clicking on email links, underscoring the critical need for public awareness in the face of evolving cyber threats.

ROSTEC's Secret Ties with China on Electronic Warfare Exposed SHARE

A recent leak revealed ROSTEC's covert collaboration with Chinese companies on advanced electronic warfare systems, showcasing internal correspondence and classified data. The documents indicate that

Chinese systems were tested during Russia's military actions in Ukraine, with a focus on countering Ukrainian drone communications. Additionally, ROSTEC appears to have engaged in industrial espionage to gain insights into China's electronic components. This disclosure highlights Russia's efforts to circumvent Western sanctions and maintain technological advances through international partnerships. The implications of such cooperation could challenge regional security dynamics, particularly for countries like India that are closely monitoring developments in electronic warfare capabilities amid rising geopolitical tensions.

AI enhances personal cybercrime threats, experts warn at Hacked 2.0 session. SHARE

At the recent Hacked 2.0 session hosted by the National Forensic Sciences University on October 15, 2025, cybersecurity experts Professor Parag Rughani and Associate Professor Nilay Mistry warned that artificial intelligence is transforming cybercrime into increasingly personal and psychologically manipulative threats. The experts demonstrated how AI tools enable cybercriminals to craft convincing phishing emails by studying victims' social media profiles, writing styles, and communication patterns for precision targeting. Notable cases presented included a North Gujarat construction company exploited through outdated Windows XP systems for fraudulent international call bills, and a disturbing incident from January 2025 where a retired CEO was blackmailed using AI-generated obscene content created from a WhatsApp video call. The session emphasized that modern AI-driven attacks utilize deepfake technology, fake social media conversations, and sophisticated impersonation techniques, making timely reporting and cultivating cyber vigilance critical for combating these evolving digital threats that pose significant risks to individuals and organizations.

Mil Personnel & Veterans

Rajnath Singh awards Neeraj Chopra honorary Lieutenant Colonel rank in Territorial Army. SHARE

On October 22, 2025, Raksha Mantri Shri Rajnath Singh conferred the honorary rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the Territorial Army to acclaimed javelin thrower Neeraj

Chopra during a ceremony in New Delhi. Celebrated as a symbol of perseverance and national pride, Chopra, a two-time Olympic medalist, has made significant contributions to Indian athletics, notably becoming the first Indian to win an Olympic Gold Medal in track and field at the Tokyo 2020 Olympics. His ongoing achievements, including a Silver Medal at the Paris 2024 Olympics and a Gold at the 2023 World Championships, highlight the potential of sports to inspire national pride and unity. This honor underscores the Indian Armed Forces' recognition of excellence beyond military service, fostering a deeper connection between sports and national identity.

Trump Nominates Lt. Gen. Christopher LaNeve as New Army Vice Chief, Replacing Mingus After Less Than Two Years



22-Oct-2025

President Donald Trump has nominated Lt. Gen. Christopher LaNeve to be the next Vice Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army, replacing Gen. James Mingus, who has served in the position since January 2024. The nomination, posted in congressional records on October 20, 2025, comes as part of a series of changes in senior military leadership under Trump and Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth. Mingus, who has held the post for less than two years, has not publicly indicated plans to step down and will continue his duties focusing on warfighting and soldier welfare. LaNeve, currently Defense Secretary Hegseth's senior military aide, would be promoted to general if confirmed by the Senate. His prior roles include commanding the Eighth Army in South Korea and leading the 82nd Airborne Division. The timing of LaNeve's confirmation hearing remains unknown.

Government issues gazette honoring gallantry awardees for Operation Sindoor and other missions.

The Central Government issued a Gazette notification on October 21, 2025, honoring gallantry awardees from various operations, prominently including Operation Sindoor. The notification listed 127 gallantry awards and 40 distinguished service awards approved by President Droupadi Murmu. Among the honored personnel are Indian Air Force and Indian Army members recognized for their exceptional courage and leadership. Group Captain Animesh Patni of the Indian Air Force received the Vir Chakra for commanding a strategic Surface-to-Air Missile squadron during Operation Sindoor, notably for orchestrating a record-

breaking 314-km surface-to-air missile strike that neutralized a high-value enemy target without losses. Colonel Koshank Lamba earned the Vir Chakra for flawlessly leading the first-ever air mobilization of a specialized equipment battery with secrecy, while Lieutenant Colonel Sushil Bisht was awarded for his decisive role in a counter-terrorism operation destroying enemy camps. The awards reflect extraordinary bravery and strategic success across air and ground operations, illustrating the valor of India's armed forces in safeguarding national security and underscoring the government's commitment to recognizing their sacrifices amidst ongoing geopolitical challenges. 290 personnel also received Mention-in-Despatches in the same notification.

The campaign targets enhanced workplace hygiene, better space management, and the disposal of outdated records, with a strong emphasis on addressing public grievances and ensuring

accountability among government bodies. Progress is monitored daily to meet set goals. This drive aligns with broader defense reforms declared for 2025, aimed at operational readiness, transparency, and governance efficiency, strengthening India's strategic posture by promoting disciplined administration and responsiveness within the armed forces and related establishments. The campaign reinforces national priorities for good governance and supports the armed forces' commitment to operational excellence.

Centre seeks SC clarification on gender-neutral hiring for armed forces.

The Indian Centre has requested the Supreme Court to clarify that its August judgment mandating gender-neutral recruitment applies only to the Army's Judge Advocate General (JAG) branch, not extending to other services within the Indian Armed Forces. The Centre argues that the ruling, which includes a 50% reservation for women, contradicts the principles of meritocracy and could lead to the exclusion of more qualified male candidates, thereby impacting operational efficiency. This legal debate highlights the tension between gender equality and the imperative of maintaining high standards within the military, reflecting broader societal discussions on gender roles in traditionally male-dominated fields. The outcome could set a precedent influencing future recruitment policies across the Indian defense services.

President Murmu's helicopter briefly sinks into wet concrete at Kerala helipad.

During President Droupadi Murmu's visit to Sabarimala, an Indian Air Force (IAF) helicopter encountered a brief but concerning incident when its wheels sank into wet concrete at a hastily constructed temporary helipad in Pramadam, Kerala. This occurred shortly after the President disembarked, prompting approximately 30 police personnel to assist in extracting the aircraft from the depression created by the soft surface. Kerala's Director General of Police clarified that the helicopter landed about five feet from the designated spot, which had not fully dried, and asserted that there was no security lapse. The decision to land at Pramadam instead of the original location at Nilakkal was made due to inclement weather. This incident highlights the

need for meticulous planning and execution in security operations, particularly concerning the transportation of high-profile officials. The quick construction of the helipad, which took place merely 12 hours prior to the landing, raises questions regarding the adequacy of pre-visit assessments and contingency planning. Authorities are expected to conduct a thorough review, ensuring that lessons are learned to prevent similar occurrences in the future, thereby enhancing the overall safety protocols for executive transport in India.

Indian and Chinese troops exchange sweets for Diwali along LAC.

On Diwali, Indian Army personnel engaged in a customary exchange of sweets with their Chinese counterparts at multiple locations along the Line of Actual Control (LAC), underscoring efforts to maintain peace and stability in the region. Simultaneously, Indian Air Force Chief Air Chief Marshal AP Singh celebrated the festival with troops in Ladakh, emphasizing their commitment in challenging high-altitude conditions as winter approaches. Diplomatic progress has been evident, with recent talks between National Security Adviser Ajit Doval and Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi, resulting in agreements aimed at effective border management and early resolution of boundary issues. This exchange reflects not only military camaraderie but also ongoing diplomatic efforts to enhance bilateral relations amidst a complex security environment, reinforcing India's commitment to peace and stability along its borders.
