### Indian Defence Ministry Advances \$9 Billion Submarine Project [SHARE](#)

25-Jan-25

The Indian Ministry of Defence has advanced the joint bid for the P75(1) project, involving a \$9 billion deal with thyssenkrupp Marine Systems (TKMS) and Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Limited (MDL) for six conventional submarines. This partnership aims to enhance India's self-reliance in submarine technology through comprehensive technology transfer (ToT) that will enable the indigenous development of future submarine designs. Previous collaborations, including the Scorpene-class submarines, faced criticism for inadequate technology absorption, raising concerns about India's ability to fully leverage ToT. However, the collaboration with TKMS presents a renewed opportunity to build domestic capabilities and reduce reliance on foreign suppliers. Successful execution of Project 76 could significantly bolster the Indian Navy's capabilities, integrating advanced features like air-independent propulsion and stealth, while also promoting India's defense manufacturing ecosystem. The ultimate effectiveness of this initiative will depend on strong leadership and a strategic commitment to developing local expertise.

### MDL to Complete India's Largest Floating Dry Dock by Year-End [SHARE](#)

Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Ltd (MDL) is constructing India's largest floating dry dock at Nhava Island, part of a Rs 5,000 crore investment plan, aiming to double its output. The floating dock, valued at Rs 475 crore, will enable the construction and repair of larger vessels, boosting MDL's capacity significantly and allowing for the simultaneous handling of up to eight ships. This expansion aligns with MDL's strategic goals to secure export orders and diversify into commercial shipbuilding. With enhanced facilities, MDL positions

itself to strengthen its competitive edge in both the defense and commercial sectors, addressing the pressing need for increased shipbuilding capacity in India.

### India's Eurodrone Observer Role and MQ-9B Purchase Enhance Defense Strategy [SHARE](#)

India's recent decision to join the Eurodrone program as an observer, coupled with its acquisition of MQ-9B drones, signifies a strategic evolution towards a multi-layered defense strategy that enhances aerial surveillance and reconnaissance capabilities. ### IAF Considers Limiting MRFA Tender to Speed Up Fighter Jet Procurement [SHARE](#)

The Indian Air Force (IAF) is contemplating a proposal to limit the Multi-Role Fighter Aircraft (MRFA) tender for 110 advanced jets to pre-qualified Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEMs) to expedite procurement amidst a shrinking combat fleet, currently at about 31 squadrons. This strategic shift aims to enhance operational readiness while addressing delays tied to unsuitable platforms. Concurrently, Russia is likely to withdraw its MiG-35 from the MRFA tender due to

production limitations and insufficient orders, which could simplify the selection process for the IAF by focusing on more proven aircraft such as the F/A-18E/F Super Hornet and Eurofighter Typhoon. This development underscores India's commitment to modernizing its air force and reducing dependency on foreign platforms while enhancing indigenous capabilities, aligning with the "Make in India" initiative.

## India and Indonesia Move Towards Defense Tech Cooperation Pact

India and Indonesia are advancing towards a framework agreement for defense cooperation and technology sharing, potentially leading to significant projects such as surface-to-surface missiles and advanced air defense systems. Ongoing discussions include the BrahMos missile system, with Indonesia expressing interest in technology transfer, while ensuring confidentiality to protect Russian and Indian interests. Additional collaboration is anticipated in submarine manufacturing, including Scorpene submarines, further solidifying defense ties. This partnership highlights India's commitment to enhancing its defense industry and strategic alliances in the Indo-Pacific region, enhancing regional security and operational capabilities.

## India-Russia Radar Partnership Boosts Missile Defense Capabilities

India is advancing its ballistic missile defense capabilities through negotiations with Russia for the Voronezh radar system technology, which will integrate with indigenous systems. The deal supports the Make in India initiative, with at least 60% of components to be manufactured locally, highlighting India's commitment to technological self-reliance. This significant enhancement in radar technology not only bolsters India's defense posture against regional threats but also signifies a strengthening of defense ties with Russia, reflecting a cooperative approach to emerging security challenges.

## IAF Enhances Precision Strikes with 300 GAURAV Glide Bombs

Long Range Glide Bombs (LRGB), designed for effective air-to-ground engagements against critical enemy infrastructure. With a range exceeding 80 kilometers and advanced guidance systems combining Inertial Navigation and GPS, these munitions allow for strategic strikes while minimizing collateral damage. Their compatibility with existing aircraft like the Su-30MKI and Mirage-2000 means enhanced operational flexibility without extensive modifications. Ultimately, this initiative reflects the IAF's commitment to modernizing its arsenal, ensuring effective deterrence and operational readiness in a dynamic geopolitical landscape.

## India Seeks Info for Indigenous 23mm Anti-Drone Ammo Development

India's Ministry of Defence has issued a Request for Information for the indigenous production of 23mm Anti-Drone Ammunition, reinforcing its commitment to self-reliance in defense manufacturing under the Make in India initiative. This ammunition will enhance the Indian Army's capabilities to counter the increasing threat posed by unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs), particularly along its borders. Designed for integration with existing ZU 23mm and Schilka weapon systems, this development showcases India's proactive approach to addressing evolving security challenges and improving military readiness against adversaries employing advanced drone tactics. This initiative not only bolsters operational capabilities but also promotes domestic defense industry growth.

## EndureAir's Sabal 20: Revolutionizing Drone Capabilities for Defense

## Indian Army to Launch "SANJAY" Real-Time Surveillance by 2025 SHARE

The project, costing Rs 2,402 crore, will be rolled out in three phases across the Army's operational units, marking a pivotal step in India's strategic modernization efforts.

## Indian Navy to Showcase INS Surat, Nilgiri, Vaghsheer on R-Day SHARE

## India Unveils Advanced Thermal Coating to Boost Hypersonic Missiles SHARE

India's Defense Research and Development Organization (DRDO) has achieved a significant milestone in its hypersonic missile program by developing an advanced Thermal Barrier Coating (TBC) for scramjet engines. This innovative ceramic material can withstand extreme temperatures, crucial for

enhancing the performance and lifespan of scramjet propulsion systems capable of exceeding Mach 5 speeds. The successful ground test of a scramjet combustor demonstrated stable combustion for 120 seconds, marking a key achievement in India's pursuit of hypersonic capabilities. This development not only strengthens India's defense potential but also positions the nation as a formidable player in the advanced military technology landscape globally.

## DRDO's Astra MkIII Missile Propulsion System Passes Ground Tests SHARE

India's Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) has made significant progress with the Astra MkIII Beyond Visual Range Air-to-Air Missile (BVRAAM), completing ground-based tests of its Solid Fuel Ducted Ramjet (SFDR) propulsion system. Anticipated service entry by 2031 reflects the thorough testing required. ## US Senate Confirms Pete Hegseth as Defense Secretary Amid Controversy SHARE

The U.S. Senate confirmed Pete Hegseth as Defense Secretary following a contentious vote, with Hegseth facing scrutiny over his qualifications and past conduct, including allegations of infidelity. Despite these controversies, he was backed by President Trump, emphasizing a shift in Pentagon leadership by pledging to eliminate Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion initiatives. This confirmation is notable as it marks a historic moment, with the Vice President casting a tie-breaking vote, making it only the second instance of such a vote for a cabinet nominee. Hegseth's appointment suggests potential changes in U.S. defense policy that could impact global geopolitics, including its relationship with India.

## Geopolitics and Security Alliances

## INS Tushil's Historic Walvis Bay Visit Boosts India-Namibia Ties SHARE

## Israel Extends Stay in Lebanon Due to Unmet Ceasefire Terms

Israeli forces will remain in southern Lebanon beyond the 60-day deadline set in a ceasefire agreement with Hezbollah, as key terms have not been enforced. The Israeli military's withdrawal is contingent on the Lebanese army's deployment in the region and the removal of Hezbollah fighters, which has yet to occur. The situation highlights ongoing tensions, with Israel's military action aimed at dismantling Hezbollah's capabilities while ensuring the safety of its citizens. This scenario underscores the complexities of regional security dynamics, especially given Hezbollah's connections to Iran and its weakened state post-

conflict, emphasizing the need for international diplomatic efforts to stabilize the area.

## Bangladesh Arming Civilians at Border Sparks Calls for Treaty Review SHARE

### Military Operations

## BSF Launches 'Ops Alert' to Secure India-Bangladesh Border Ahead of Republic Day SHARE

The Border Security Force (BSF) has initiated 'Ops Alert' from January 22 to 31, 2025, along the 4,096-km India-Bangladesh border to enhance security ahead of India's Republic Day celebrations. ## Terrorism and Counterterrorism

### US Supreme Court Clears Way for Rana's Extradition to India SHARE

The US Supreme Court has denied Tahawwur Rana's final appeal against extradition to India, paving the way for him to face charges related to the 2008 Mumbai attacks that claimed 166 lives. Rana, a Canadian national of Pakistani origin and an associate of main conspirator David Coleman Headley, attempted to contest the extradition based on the interpretation of the US-India extradition treaty. However, US Solicitor General Elizabeth B. Prelogar emphasized that India's charges, including forgery and use of false information, were not addressed in his previous US trial. This ruling is a significant victory for India, allowing it to pursue justice for the victims of one of the deadliest terrorist attacks in its history, reinforcing India's commitment to combat terrorism and secure accountability.

### Properties of 11 Pakistan-based Terrorists Seized in Major Crackdown SHARE

In a significant move against terrorism, the Special NIA court in Doda has ordered the attachment of properties belonging to 11 terrorists operating from Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied-Kashmir. This action follows an exhaustive investigation into anti-national activities, reinforcing India's commitment to disrupt terror networks. The properties, totaling 52 Kanals, have been marked to inform the public of their seizure, with authorities indicating that additional properties belonging to 18 more absconding terrorists are also being targeted. This crackdown underscores the determination of Indian law enforcement to ensure regional security and sends a clear message to those involved in or supporting terrorism, urging them to desist from such activities and reintegrate into society.

### 14 Maoists, 8 with bounties of Rs 36 lakh, captured in Bijapur. SHARE

In a significant anti-Maoist operation, security forces in Bijapur apprehended 14 hardcore Maoists, with 8 carrying a collective bounty of Rs 36 lakh. This operation, involving the Bijapur District Reserve Guard, District Police Force, CoBRA Battalion, and CRPF, targeted Maoist strongholds linked to various violent acts, including IED attacks. The arrests follow a recent

joint operation that resulted in the elimination of 16 Maoists, including a high-value target, Jayram alias Chalapathi. Union Home Minister Amit Shah reiterated the government's commitment to eradicating Maoism by March 31, 2026, highlighting the ongoing resolve of Indian security forces in combating this insurgency.

### India urges Pakistan to act against cross-border terrorism threats. SHARE

India has firmly called upon Pakistan to take decisive action against cross-border terrorism, with the Ministry of External Affairs highlighting global awareness of Pakistan's role as a promoter of terrorism. Indian Army Chief General Upendra Dwivedi reiterated that a significant portion of active terrorists in Jammu and Kashmir are of Pakistani origin, linking the region's violence to Pakistan's orchestration. He emphasized the positive trend of local populations engaging in electoral processes, indicating a preference for peace over violence. The induction of additional troops has led to a reduction in violence and successful neutralization of terrorists, further asserting India's commitment to counter-terrorism efforts in the region.

### Hamas Gains 10,000-15,000 New Recruits Amid Ongoing Conflict SHARE

Hamas has reportedly recruited 10,000 to 15,000 fighters since the recent conflict with Israel began, potentially maintaining a lasting threat despite suffering significant losses. U.S. intelligence suggests that while the group has successfully attracted new, often untrained members, the fighting capability may remain diminished. Israeli officials acknowledge Hamas's recruitment drive but argue that new members lack the necessary training and weaponry. The ongoing ceasefire negotiations highlight the complexities of Gaza's governance and the Israeli military's intent to further degrade Hamas's capabilities, reflecting the persistent challenges in achieving long-term stability in the region.

## Cybersecurity and Information Warfare

### FBI Warns: "Act Fast" Phrases Signal Phishing Scams SHARE

25-Jan-25

The FBI has issued a warning about sophisticated phishing scams that exploit phrases like "act fast" to

create urgency and manipulate victims into sharing sensitive information. According to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center, over 4,500 complaints related to fraudulent charities resulted in \$96 million in losses in 2024. The rise of artificial intelligence has further enhanced the effectiveness of these scams, making fake communications nearly indistinguishable from legitimate ones. Cybersecurity experts urge vigilance, advising individuals to scrutinize email addresses, avoid clicking unknown links, and verify claims through trusted channels, emphasizing that caution is the best defense against evolving cyber threats.

## Mil Personnel & Veterans

### Govt Honors 942 Police, Fire, and Civil Defense Heroes with Medals SHARE

25-Jan-25

The Indian government has awarded 942 medals to police, fire, and civil defense personnel, including 95 gallantry awards, on the eve of Republic Day. Among the gallantry recipients, 28 served in Left Wing Extremism-affected areas and 28 in Jammu and Kashmir, highlighting the bravery of these forces in challenging environments. The awards comprise 101 Presidents Medals for Distinguished Service and 746 Medals for Meritorious Service, recognizing exceptional dedication and valor. This initiative underscores the government's commitment to honor and motivate personnel who risk their lives for public safety and national security, reinforcing the importance of their contributions in maintaining peace and order across the country.

### President grants gallantry awards to 93 personnel ahead of Republic Day 2025. SHARE

On the eve of the 76th Republic Day, President Droupadi Murmu approved gallantry awards for 93 Armed Forces personnel, including 11 posthumous recognitions, with notable honors such as two Kirti Chakras and 14 Shaurya Chakras. The Navy's distinguished awards included multiple Param Vishisht Seva Medals and Nao Sena Medals for gallantry and devotion to duty, highlighting the bravery and commitment of its members. This recognition underscores India's dedication to honoring the sacrifices and exceptional

service of its armed forces, fostering morale and unity within the military community while reinforcing national pride.

### CRPF Leads with 19 Gallantry Medals on Republic Day SHARE

On the eve of the 76th Republic Day, the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) was awarded 19 gallantry medals, the highest among Indian police forces. ### Indian Fisherman Dies in Pakistani Jail After Serving Sentence

Currently, 180 Indian fishermen await release after serving their sentences, and there have been calls for improved diplomatic efforts to ensure their safety and timely repatriation. This incident underscores the ongoing humanitarian issues stemming from territorial disputes, necessitating urgent attention from Indian authorities to safeguard the rights of its fishermen.

### Modi to Co-Chair Global AI Summit in France, Strengthening Ties

This pragmatic approach underscores India's focus on energy security and economic efficiency, balancing immediate energy needs with long-term strategic considerations.

### Hamas Releases Four Israeli Hostages in Prisoner Swap Deal

Hamas recently released four Israeli female soldier hostages in exchange for around 200 Palestinian prisoners, part of a ceasefire agreement aimed at ending a prolonged conflict in Gaza. Israeli authorities report that after this exchange, 90 hostages remain in Gaza, while casualty figures indicate over 47,000 Palestinians and more than 400 Israeli soldiers have lost their lives since the conflict escalated on October 7, 2023. The situation underscores the complexities of negotiations in conflict zones and the humanitarian impact of prolonged violence.

### Houthi rebels release 153 detainees amid rising tensions in Yemen

## Netanyahu Backs Musk Amid Controversy, Calls Him a 'Great Friend'

Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu defended Elon Musk amidst controversy over a gesture some interpreted as a Nazi salute, citing Musk's steadfast support for Israel, especially following the October 7 Hamas attacks. Netanyahu praised Musk's commitment to Israel's right to self-defense and downplayed the backlash, which included criticism from Jewish organizations. Musk dismissed the allegations as unfounded, attributing the gesture to "awkward enthusiasm" and responded with humor. Critics argue Netanyahu's endorsement reflects a troubling association with individuals linked to extremist views, raising concerns about the implications of such alliances in the context of geopolitical narratives. This situation underscores the complex interplay between public figures, political allegiances, and societal perceptions.

## Chinese Investors in Pakistan Claim Harassment by Sindh Police

Chinese investors in Pakistan have alleged harassment by Sindh police, claiming intimidation and illegal detention, prompting them to seek judicial intervention to declare these actions unconstitutional and to secure their safety and freedom of movement. This situation highlights ongoing concerns regarding the security and rights of foreign investors in Pakistan, particularly amid rising tensions in the region. The allegations could undermine Pakistan's investment climate, especially for initiatives linked to the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), which is crucial for Pakistan's economic development. The Indian perspective suggests that such instability could further erode confidence in Pakistan's governance, potentially benefiting India strategically in regional geopolitics.

## Assam CM Sarma Seeks Japanese Investments in Electronics and Energy

## Jitender Pal Singh Named India's Next Ambassador to Israel SHARE
